## **Presenters**



Andrew Houtenville, PhD, is a Professor of Economics and Research Director of the Institute on Disability at the University of New Hampshire. Dr. Houtenville is extensively involved in disability statistics and employment policy research. He has published widely in the areas of disability statistics and the economic status of people with disabilities. He is the Principal Investigator on the NIDILRR-funded Employment Policy and Measurement Rehabilitation and Research Training Center. Dr. Houtenville received his Ph.D. in Economics from the University of New Hampshire in 1997 and was a National Institute on Aging Post-Doctoral Fellow at Syracuse University in 1998/1999.



Shreya Paul, MPA, Ms. Shreya Paul is a Project Director at the Institute on Disability, University of New Hampshire. After completing her undergraduate degree in Mathematics, she pursued her master's degree in public affairs (MPA) with a concentration on policy analysis from Indiana University. Shreya served in Teach for India during her early professional career, working in schools teaching underprivileged children. During this time, she taught students with learning disabilities and became aware of the existing inequalities. Her educational background in policy analysis along with her teaching experience motivated her to pursue a career in disability research. Shreya's work at IOD includes collecting, analyzing and interpreting data to publish the Annual Disability Statistics Compendium each year. She is also leading the creation of

the Disability Statistics Curriculum, a first of its kind curriculum, aimed at teaching how to access and analyze existing disability data. Through her work, she seeks to make disability statistics accessible to all members of the disability community while contributing to the field of policy research in a practical way.



Megan Henly, PhD, has over 20 years of experience in research and survey methodology in academia, the federal government, and non-profit sectors. She has been with the Institute on Disability since 2017 where her work centers on disparities in economic outcomes and social participation for people with disabilities. Her recent research examined qualitative aspects of job quality for college graduates with disabilities, differences in transportation patterns by disability status, and the methodological differences across data sources when considering the impact of food insecurity on people with disabilities. Dr. Henly's current projects explore the role of community characteristics in shaping the outcomes of people aging with a disability in rural areas, and primary data collection that considers the intersection of functional ability, job accommodation, and job requirements.



**Sawyer Rogers** is a Disability Research Assistant at the IOD. He is a senior at the University of New Hampshire studying political science, history, and public administration.
